What We Are Learning About the Pika in the North Cascades

Hiking in the North Cascades you likely have heard the high-pitch squeak or “eeennck” of the American pika. These cute furry mammals, with rounded ears and long whiskers, are a key indicator species in North Cascades National Park. Last summer, the park began a study of pika populations to build a baseline of data about where pika can be found and attributes of their habitat.

Climate change is one of the biggest issues facing our national parks. “Studying animals like the pika is critical to understanding what’s happening with the species and the environment, and helping inform parks management strategies,” says Dr. Jason Bruggeman of Beartooth Wildlife Research in Farmington, Minn., who is
